From the Vicarage, October 2014

Dear Friends,

We seem to have gathered the Harvest – but as one is ‘safely gathered in’, the work begins to provide for another year. It is often held that the date of this new beginning is Michaelmas Day, the Feast of St Michael on 29th September.

In England it has long been one of the ‘Quarter Days – when rents for a quarter of the year were due. Farmers obviously being expected to be able to pay !

This was also the day when contracts between landlords and tenants, as well as masters and servants officially ended. This meant many were looking for jobs, and so fairs were held – known as ‘hiring’ or ‘mop’ fairs, and these were the place where many new working agreements were made. This is now almost extinct but used to be a time of feasting and family festivity – and often the central element was a goose ‘Whoso eats goose on Michaelmass Day, Shall never lack money his debts to pay’. For the writer it is the day on which I was Ordained – but I never claimed I was ‘goosed’!!

At the end of the month All Hallows Eve (now known as Halloween) is celebrated. This was a mixture of ancient pagan ideas, folklore and religion, often accompanied, on the 31st October – the end of the Celtic year – with the ceremonial extinguishing and lighting of fires. The next day, Nov 1st became, All Saints Day –considered a very holy day. Halloween was/is a

time of mystery, when ghosts, witches and the 'little folk' had to be avoided and evil spirits needed to be driven away. It was a busy time as these manifestations dared not be around on All Hallows! Bonfires were said to drive them away, as well as stomping and shouting in the fields – which evil spirit would brave a horrible face cut in an hollowed-out turnip or a candle? Apples and nuts also proliferate in Halloween – the Roman festival was in honour of Pomona – goddess of fruit, and there were all sorts of stories about apples and pips and discovering whom young maidens would marry. Duck-apple (in a bowl) and Snap-apple (on a string) are still popular today.

But times change – and people (generally) are no longer afraid of evil spirits. Halloween is now an evening of fun. An old Scottish prayer (which I can use, as they're still with us!) ;-:

*'From ghoulies and ghosties and long leggety beasties
And things that go bump in the night,
Good lord deliver us.'*

I hope to start the Confirmation sessions on Thursday 2nd October at 6.30 in the Vicarage but will try to contact people directly – these 6 (?) meetings will last for approximately 40 minutes per session.
